Rosemary's Reflections



When I was at school a long time ago in a galaxy far, far away, we learned things largely by memorisation and repetition. Whether it was times tables or word-spelling, poetry or mathematical formulae, chunks of Shakespeare or French grammar, our academic progress depended on how much and how accurately we remembered. It was the same at Sunday School. We memorised parts of the Bible and the answers to the Child's Catechism and the Shorter Catechism, aimed at giving us Food Basics of the spiritual kind, whether we really understood them or not. In Sunday School we even had to pass an exam on what we learned. That meant going one-on-one with the minister and hoping you'd get it right! I remember the first minister I encountered on a personal basis. I was about five. He had white hair, wore a black suit and seemed to be as old as Methusaleh. I was terrified. I thought he was God! (Disclosure – I don't think that about ministers now!)

Many of the Bible passages that I learned way back then have stood me in good stead in times of trouble and doubt in my life. This has been particularly true in the COVID-19 time that we have been enduring, seemingly forever, and whose after-effects will be with us for years. I found myself reflecting on, for example, the story of Noah and the Flood, of the 40-year-long trek of the Israelites through the desert, of their years of exile in Babylon and of the trials of early Christians. Suddenly these stories stopped being just tales from the past and became human experiences that I could identify with. I could enter into the pain and frustration and fear. I could recognise the longing for the way things were and for the road home. Of course in many ways "home" wasn't there any more. Just as for us things won't be the same again, even when the pandemic is stuff for the history books. What will, however, be the same is God's eternal and loving presence in and around us.





The COVID-19 pandemic has caused the cancellation of the annual General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. As a result, the Rev. Amanda Currie, Moderator of the General Assembly, is serving in this capacity for another year.

The Moderator is sad that her scheduled visits around the country have had to be cancelled, so she has decided to be with the different congregations in prayer on her daily walks around her neighbourhood in Saskatchewan. She is walking 1 km for each congregation and ministry of our denomination and ecumenical partner in the Canadian Council of Churches. That's about 10-11 km per day. She will be praying as she walks. The International page in the summer edition of the Presbyterian Connection newsletter contains an article on Mission Staff in 2020. It is note-worthy that three of the eight staff members mentioned in the article have a connection to St. Andrew's, Brampton.



The Rev. Dr. Paul McLean is a child of our congregation. His parents, Don and Mary McLean were well-respected Elders of our church. Paul is a bible translator, and he is now working remotely with nine indigenous teams in Taiwan in translating the bible into their indigenous languages.

The coronavirus pandemic precipitated the early return to Canada from Malawi of the Rev. Dr. Blair Bertrand, his wife Vivian and their three children – Garrett, Sage and Zoe. In Malawi, Blair taught at the Zomba Theological College and supported the work of the Synod Youth Department. Vivian worked with Churches in Action in Relief and Development. Blair is continuing his work for the PCC remotely. Vivian is now job searching while finishing up her work in Malawi remotely.

Blair served at St. Andrew's as a lay person from 2004-2005, and after his ordination as Associate Minister for Youth and Families from 2005-2008.

The Bertrands are temporarily housed at the Crieff Hills Retreat Centre, and plan to move to Ottawa later in the year.

Special thanks go out to Paul Willoughby who has volunteered to look after the church's flower and vegetable gardens over the summer. Paul also cleans up after the homeless people who sleep on the church property.

Paul mentioned that he has planted some fibrous begonias in the rockery. These were a donation from his friend Michael Avis who, by coincidence, also tunes the church pianos. Thank you, Michael.

Serving Elders and Supporting Elders (known as the St. Andrew's Council of Elders) had their annual summer get-together on June 15 by Zoom. This was quite a change from the usual potluck barbeque! Approximately 28 people joined in and everyone agreed that St. Andrew's should not be open for Worship Services before September.

During the last week of May, Victoria Dewar presented a research presentation during the North American Society for Sport Management's Virtual 2020 Conference. Victoria was accepted to the conference in January after submitting a research abstract put together with the support of her advisor, Dr. Olan Scott, one of the professors in the Sport Management department at Brock University where Victoria is studying. The conference was set to take place in San Diego, California but was shifted to a virtual platform due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Victoria's presentation was titled "Increasing Engagement and Online Interest in Women's University Sport: An Analysis of a Canadian Women's Hockey Team's Social Media Content" and focused on the social media content of the Brock Badgers' Women's Hockey team. Victoria has been the team's Social Media Coordinator for the past three years. Victoria has seen this process as quite a daunting task as an undergraduate student as most of the presenters at the conference were full-time professors or PhD candidates. With the conference now complete, Victoria's next steps are to continue to work with Dr. Scott on a manuscript to be submitted to a sport management journal for review and potential publication.



Food... for Thought

There have been many changes in your Food Bank since the COVID-19 virus closed St. Andrew's and forced the Food Bank to relocate to the Regeneration Thrift Store warehouse. I would like to explain how the client growth from 500 families per month to 2,000 families has been accomplished. The good part of the move was that we didn't have to transport food; most of it was already there. We had our share of food from the Gift of Giving Back stored there and decided to use that and pray for it to be replenished. It happened!

The Thrift Store had to close because of the virus and the sorting space was released to the Food Bank in order to sort and store the bulk shipments that came in. The St. Andrew's volunteers picked up at local stores and assisted the pickup of bulk donations by Regeneration staff, resulting in skids of non-perishable food waiting to be sorted and used. St. Andrew's continues to be active at the Food Bank but participation has slowly dropped off since the start. Our main focus is to provide a balanced diet to the clients by purchasing items that aren't donated, such as coffee, powdered milk, potatoes, bananas, apples, oranges, carrots and canned fruit or vegetables as needed.

One problem quickly arose; there wasn't enough refrigeration or freezer space. Fresh and frozen product was being given away or discarded. A temporary solution was when Session allowed us access to the freezers at St. Andrew's to store frozen material. The staff at Regeneration also contacted transportation companies in the area, and two reefer trailers were donated – one for refrigeration and one for storing frozen product.

Members of the community have supported the Food Bank through purchasing donation bags at grocery stores and one store in particular, Foodland, at 456 Vodden St., has supported us by donating skids of food, allowing us to purchase many products at cost and actually helping to select less expensive items and load our vehicles.

It has been a concerted effort by many people including the City of Brampton and Regeneration that has allowed us to continue serving the clients. A partial list of donors is shown below.

A big thank you to those who sewed up a storm and made protective masks – there were over 60 masks collected. These masks will be distributed to members of the congregation who are in need of a mask. Several church members also dropped off canned goods to the church Saturday morning. A trunk load of donated food was delivered to the Regeneration Food Bank.

The congregation responded to the call for appreciation cards for first responders and hospital workers. Many members wrote beautiful messages of hope, support and thanks for the front-line workers in Brampton who are keeping our community healthy and safe. First Responder appreciation cards were delivered to the Peel Regional Police – 21 Division, Brampton Fire Department on Vodden Street, the Peel Paramedics on Sandalwood Parkway, and the Hospital Worker appreciation cards were delivered to Brampton Civic Hospital.



A group of keen gardeners spent most of the day weeding the beds and planting flowers and vegetables in the gardens around St. Andrew's while

Hour of Corporate Prayer and Virtual Prayer Vigil

In June, we continued to pray as a virtual group every week for an end to the COVID-19 pandemic and other situations around the world and at home.

On the Mission Committee “Mission Possible” June 5-6 weekend we held a “Virtual Day of Prayer” on the Saturday, and faithful St. Andrew’s volunteers each led an hour of prayer from 8 am till midnight, praying for issues around COVID-19, the Black Lives Matter demonstrations in 90 cities across the US and other cities around the world, including Toronto, peace in a number of countries at war and for the millions of refugees who have been made homeless due to war, fires and hurricanes as well as other national/international concerns.

Sadly, the US continues to lead the world with the greatest number of pandemic cases (about one-third of the world’s total), and the greatest per capita death rate. Fortunately, our government is keeping the Canada / US border closed till mid July. Sadly for us, the death rate is greatest among our most vulnerable in Long Term Care and Retirement Homes and it was encouraging to see our armed forces take off their helmets and uniforms, put on scrubs and assume the role of caregivers in a variety of retirement homes, including Grace Manor in Holland Christian Homes. We continue to pray for our front line first responders, doctors, nurses, paramedics, personal care workers, our police and firefighters and the thousands of volunteers who still operate our food banks and other safety net facilities.

Thankfully the main answer to prayer is that the rate of new cases seems to be in the decline in Canada as a result of “Stay at Home” and “mitigation” strategies which have seemed to “flatten the curve” leading to a gradual opening up of various parts of our economies. Sadly, today, Peel county remains a hot spot and things are slower to open up.

Although Session at St. Andrew’s has closed the building to the public and suspended all events until further notice, weekly services continue to take place ‘virtually,’ through the St. Andrew’s Facebook page and YouTube videos from Rev. Geoff’s home. Some discussions are taking place at Session to work out the details regarding when and how to open up or resume church services at the building. **Prayer, however, continues every week at 3 pm for an end to this pandemic and for wisdom on how to safely open our doors.**

The Elders have joined with others across the country and around the world to pray together with a common purpose — to ask God for treatment and a cure. The groups meet in their own homes at 3 pm every Friday to pray as a “virtual group” with Christians around the world: for an end to this pandemic, the families of the deceased, those infected with the virus, the front line workers, medical supplies, and those with cancelled surgery.
