"The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." (Mark 1:1 NRSV)

Session 10: Tues., May 4th Jerusalem: "The Anointing, Betrayal, & Death of Jesus" Question 1) Our reading opens with Mark's account of Jesus' being 'anointed' by a woman during a meal and the ensuing argument: Many believe that the woman's anointing was an act of selfless, sacrificial, worship – others felt that is was a waste of money and resources; what do you think? How would you describe her action or gift? What place does sacrificial devotion – giving gifts to God – have in worship?

Question 2) After the Passover meal (the Last Supper), Jesus and the disciples walk to the Mount of Olives, where He tells them what is about to happen – how they will desert Him, and then predicts that even Peter will deny Him – and then, how, within hours, he does deny Jesus: What are your thoughts about the disciple's and their wavering, fairweather faith? In what ways are you – or have you been – like them? How do you feel you live up to what it means to be a Christ-follower?

Question 3) As Jesus' death nears He recites the opening verse from Psalm 22; "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" After you've read Psalm 22, consider the language of pain, suffering, even doubt that makes up the first half of the Psalm; then reflect on the tone and language from verse 19 on: In what way does knowing that even Jesus cries a prayer of pain and suffering as He nears His death, but stays faithful and trusts in God's grace and mercy, help you in your faith – and in times of fear or doubt? Does His anguish make Jesus more 'relatable'?
