

Wayne's World

A Little Bit of Advent and A Little Bit of Christmas

Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; He is Christ the Lord. And here is a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling



clothes and lying in a manger. [Reflects the 12-day Christmas season: the Son of God is born to be with us.] - Luke 2:11,12

We begin with how the lighting of candles placed on the Advent wreath signifies the meaning of Advent and leads us into Christmas.

The Advent Story

The use of the Advent wreath is an early German custom used four Sundays before Christmas. The dictates of the Church read as follows:

"Gather ye evergreens, cedar and pine, twine them into a circle everlasting

and garnish with the fruits of the earth."

The first Sunday of Advent, a violet candle is lit. The first candle signifies the prophets' hopes and prayers. The second Sunday, a second violet candle is lit signifying the stable birthplace of the Christ Child. The third Sunday, an old rose candle is lit for the good news the angels sang to all peoples. The last Sunday of Advent, a violet candle is lit signifying the worship and gifts of the Wisemen. One minute after midnight Christmas Eve, a single tall white taper is lit to signify the birth of the Christ Child, His goodness and His purity. Christmas Day, the violet and the old rose candles can be changed to red to signify the joy of the world upon the hearing of the Christ Child's birth.

This takes us into Christmas. I am going to use the word "CHRISTMAS" as an acrostic and put things in bullet note form – firstly to save you a lot of reading at this busy time of year, and secondly to allow you to reflect on the notes for each letter and invite you to make your own mental notes on each letter and apply them as they relate to you for the Christmas season.








Church Finances

In late March of this year, an exceptionally heavy snowfall, followed by rain, brought down the eaves troughs and underlying wooden eaves on the west side of the church building. This revealed the very poor condition of the woodwork and the ends of the underlying roof truss because water had been leaking through to the trusses for many years. The Property Committee hired an engineering firm in June to assess the damage, select a contractor and supervise the needed repairs. It was determined that the west and north sides were at a critical stage, so they will be repaired this year.



Our contractor arrived on site a month ago and immediately commenced work on the west side of the building. Looking at the first picture from left to right, you can see their repair process. On the far left, the old woodwork along the face has been removed, along with the steel sheeting along the roof and the underlying (rotted) roof boards. In the middle of the roof, new four-foot supports have been attached to the roof trusses on either side of them, and new plywood sheeting has been attached on top. On the far right, wooden fascia boards have been added, and waterproof "blue skin" has been installed over the plywood. Moving to the second picture on the north (parking lot) side, new metal sheeting has been installed over the plywood. At this point, the west and north sides are completely finished, and our roof is waterproof and protected from the elements.

The next phase is the installation of the aluminum "cap" over the wood fascia board. This cap will be folded by a fabricator to look very similar to the former wooden exterior and will have a painted finish that lasts for several decades. The final piece will be the installation of the new eaves troughs and downspouts. These last two steps have been delayed while the metal fabricator works to achieve the proper bends and colour match. Hopefully, they will be complete before the snow arrives.



You can see the phases, as they remove the old roof, insert the new ends of the trusses and then install the new roof (blue) and fascia.

Stewardship Corner

The narrative budget meeting was held in person in the Church Sanctuary on Sunday, November 19, 2023 and viewed online via Microsoft Teams. Financial statements had been made available to the congregation one week prior to this meeting.

Rev. Wayne Baswick opened the meeting in prayer. Jean Bradshaw, Clerk of Session, was appointed to take the Minutes of the meeting.

Anna-Marie Dewar, Treasurer, conducted the budget meeting. She presented each committee's proposed budget for 2024. Anna-Marie listed the various sources of revenue for St. Andrew's, along with their expenses. The budget projected a deficit of \$44,200. She also went over the different ways to donate to the Church. Throughout the meeting, people had the opportunity to ask questions.

Anna-Marie moved that the budget be approved as presented. This was seconded by Helen Collins. By a show of hands or vocal agreement from the online congregation, the vote to pass the budget was unanimous. A copy of the budget is on page 7 of this newsletter.

A special thank you to Anna-Marie for all the time and effort she spent on putting the presentation together. Also, thank you to Peter Shepherd for all of his computer support.

Following the budget discussion Stan Loree asked the congregation to vote on a different issue. Stan made a motion to request more money from the Flame Endowment Fund. The amount would be less than \$50,000 or the actual cost for the repair of the Church's eaves as of December 31, 2023. The request was approved by the congregation.

Overall, it was a very successful budget meeting. With God's help and the continued generous support of the members of St Andrew's, 2024 will be a better year financially for St. Andrew's.
