#### Byron's Bridge

Connecting Faith to Daily Life



This edition of the St. Andrews newsletter comes to you on the eve of our Anniversary Sunday, as we leave behind us the early autumn weather, and head into more bracing temperatures. Although it will get colder in the weeks ahead, we can still rejoice!

So many things are on the horizon for us as the year begins to draw to a close: Anniversary Sunday, Remembrance Day, the beginning of Advent and the Christmas season, culminating in that still silent night; then, on to the New Year! What an exciting time to be a part of the church. What an exciting time to live in the light of the good news!

Fall and Winter in our Northern climate always remind me of the line from Luke 2:14, especially the KJV translation which has been immortalized in the English-speaking Christian consciousness: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Modern scholars tell us that the King James Version translation of the Bible is in many places unreliably translated, and that we shouldn't rely upon it too heavily. However, for hundreds of years the KJV was the standard translation which brought the world and words of the Gospel to the English-speaking world, and although it may err in some spots, the spirit that its

rich language embodies is undeniably and deeply Christian. That passage in the KJV translation is, to me, proof of that spirit.

In the modern translation called the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV), Luke 2:14 is translated like this: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" Now that may be a faithful literal translation of the original Koine Greek of the New Testament, but it is definitely missing a certain je ne sais quoi which exists in the KJV. It's that "good will toward men" portion that really does it for me.

As the Fall begins to close around us, and Winter sets in, the world around us here in Canada begins to get colder and darker. But just as that cold sets in, the spirit of Christ within us begins to warm and burn brighter than ever. We are reminded by the harsh winter that there are people outside who could use our help, and if we are good Christians, our response will be to meet their need with compassion and acts of service. It's good will toward the men and women of our community that Christ fosters within us at this time of year. It is the spirit of the church to have this good will at all times, but the colder seasons are when we are more deeply reminded of it.

That's why I love living in Canada. Yes, we could complain about the cold, but we can also take it as God's natural reminder to us that we need each other, and that kindness and good will are necessary.

So, as Fall carries on, and Winter readies itself to take the stage, let's remember those classic words of the gospel from our good friend King James, and spend this Fall and Winter exercising that good will which Jesus taught us to foster within ourselves and within the church.

#### **Women's Missionary Society**

We held our Thanksgiving service on Tuesday, October 7th, 2025, in the parlour. The service this year was written by the Rev. Marianne Emig Carr, minister of First Presbyterian Church, Brockville, and St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Caintown, ON.

In the meditation, the Rev. Marianne Emig Carr, gave us pause to think on what Paul was writing in his letters. Here is an excerpt: 'Thanksgiving turns us from an inward focus to looking with compassion at our community and beyond. It is important to remember that Paul's letters, such as Philippians, were written to communities and not just individuals. Paul is imagining God's harvest emerging from a small community of faith, in which each of the members matters for the well-being of the whole.'

The Rev. Marianne Emig Carr goes on to say 'We are not always free to determine **what** happens to us, but we are relatively free to choose **how we will respond** to whatever happens to us. During this Thanksgiving, and every day, let us give thanks to God for the gift of life with our prayers of gratitude and our anthems of praise. But let us also begin by expressing our gratitude not primarily in words but in deeds, in helping to give the gift of life in all its fullness to others.'

The word 'Thanksgiving' actually means giving thanks! A lot of people do not take the time to thank

God on Thanksgiving. To them, Thanksgiving is just a day off, a fancy meal, etc. To them
Thanksgiving has nothing to do with giving thanks.
But as Christians, we have to make sure we keep the 'thanks' in Thanksgiving. We must make sure we take the time to give thanks for everything God gives us.

Thank you, Rev. Marianne Emig Carr, for reminding us of what Thanksgiving means and how we should be giving thanks to God for all that He has given to us.

Mark your calendar for our Christmas Worship service and Potluck lunch on Tuesday December 9th. We will have Communion at 12:00pm followed by our lunch and worship service. We hope you can join us.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday, November 4th, at 1:00 pm for a time of Remembrance – All are welcome.

I will close off this month with the blessing from

our Thanksgiving Worship - "As we go out into the world, let us be grateful for all that we have.

#### Prayer Circle Group Report August and September 2025


